

Special Government Employees: ARS Collaborators and NIFA Panel Managers

Routinely, the Agricultural Research Service uses the Special Government Employee (SGE) appointment to hire Collaborators for specific projects. Additionally, the National Institute of Food & Agriculture uses the SGE appointment to hire Panel Managers for specific projects.

Although there is some supervision, SGEs generally work in an unstructured environment. They are appointed to perform temporary duties, with or without compensation, for no more than 130 days during any period of 365 consecutive days. SGEs confer or engage in discussions and special projects and are involved in other issues of mutual interest to the agencies of REE.

While serving in this capacity, SGEs must comply with the same Ethics rules as other Government employees. Ethics rules are often complex and require some analysis in applying them to specific situations. However, given the length of the SGEs employment, these rules are not as restrictive as those governing other employees.

As part of your SGE appointment, you are required to complete ethics training which consists of reviewing the information listed below. Once you have completed this review, please e-mail the USDA Office of Ethics at **Ethics-REE@usda.gov** to advise you have completed the required SGE training.]
